Mixed Level Option: You may have some members of your family in Standard oversight, and some in Record keeping oversight. You would only pay one fee (\$50) for this mixed level of oversight.

The Standard option and Record Keeping options use similar Methods & Objectives forms for elementary and middle school students. Paperwork remains the same for Standard oversight in high school, while it changes significantly for Record Keeping students

Additional Differences

Diplomas: High School seniors with record keeping level membership will be given a high-quality diploma at no additional cost. It will reflect the ministry as the school's name, and can be signed by the Lead Academic Advisor as well as parents***.

Standard level oversight high school seniors will be offered the opportunity to purchase a diploma with the rest of the umbrella. These diplomas will NOT be signed by their advisor, nor may they list the umbrella as the school name because we have not exercised appropriate oversight to do so. They will not reflect the ministry as the school's name for the same reason.

All members of our umbrella have a standing invitation to participate in graduation with PACE, a co-op which meets at First Baptist Church of La Plata.

Purpose of Reviews

The purpose of portfolio reviews is to **verify** regular and thorough instruction in the subjects required by Maryland law.

Procedures when portfolio does not meet Requirements

Although we have never encountered a portfolio that does not meet the standard of regular and thorough instruction, these procedures would be followed:

- During the Review: parent will be notified and given a written checklist identifying area(s) where more evidence is required.
- o Follow Up:
 - o a second appointment will be set to review additional evidence. If it is provided, process is complete
 - o If sufficient evidence is not provided at second appointment, the parent will speak directly to the committee to outline any circumstances.
- o The committee will:
 - Decide to extend a probationary period to the parent, during which the adviser will check in monthly via phone or in person, to provide additional mentoring. At the end of the following year, if the parent has improved evidence, probationary period is lifted OR
 - The committee can alternately decide to remove the individual from membership in the umbrella

A GOOD RULE OF THUMB FOR EVIDENCE IS ONE TO TWO SAMPLES PER MONTH FOR FACH SUBJECT YOU MAY PROVIDE MORE OF COURSE!

OVERSIGHT PROCEDURES

STANDARD LEVEL: Oversight under this program takes the place of reviews with the nal Ninton County Public School system. It does not provide transcripts or diplomas.

RECORD KEEPING: In addition to taking the place of County reviews, this level provides transcripts to all students. High School diplomas are available to students who meet all requirements.

MENTORSHIP: Additionally, our advisors are all experienced homeschoolers who make themselves available to help our families with any questions they may have about home education.

Membership Requirements

Standard Level:

- o Meet all deadlines specified in IMPORTANT DEADLINES section
- During the school year, provide their students with regular, thorough instruction in required subjects – English, Math, Science, Social Studies, Health, Physical Education, Music, and Art
- Keep samples of work in each subject for each student. The samples should demonstrate progress, and that instruction was regular and thorough.
- o Annual portfolio review in June

Record Keeping:

- o Meet all deadlines specified in IMPORTANT DEADLINES section
- During the school year, provide their students with regular, thorough instruction in required subjects – English, Math, Science, Social Studies, Health, Physical Education, Music, and Art
- Keep samples of work in each subject for each student. The samples should demonstrate progress, and that instruction was regular and thorough.
- o More in-depth record keeping is required, particularly at the high school level. Please be familiar with all forms in the Record Keeping section.
- o Quarterly reviews, as well as in person meeting in September each year


This practice will provide a more convenient means of submitting paperwork during, and after, this crisis passes.

Please follow the instructions below to sign a document digitally, and then email it to your advisor.

Software Needed: Adobe Acrobat Reader

STEP ONE: Download the advising paperwork. You will need to open it in Adobe Reader

When you click on the link for the paperwork, you can click the "Open in Acrobat" shown below, or click on the download arrow, and double click on the file in Windows Explorer




STEP TWO: Fill in the information required. Now locate the signature area






STEP THREE: Click on the signature box. An Adobe signature request will open. Follow the prompts to Configure Digital ID. You will be able to save it






STEP FOUR: Create a new digital signature. You may save it to your computer





STEP FIVE: Follow all prompts, filling in the appropriate information. When you get to this screen, enter your password you just created in the bottom left corner. It will prompt you to save a new copy of the document.


Note that this will create a legally binding copy of your e-signature

MARYLAND HOME SCHOOL LAWS (COMAR)



13A.10.01.01

.01 Home Instruction Program.

13A.10.01.01

- .01 Home Instruction Program.
- A. Purpose. The purpose of this regulation is to establish a procedure to be used by the superintendent of each local school system to determine if a child participating in a home instruction program is receiving regular, thorough instruction during the school year in the studies usually taught in the public schools to children of the same age.
- B. Written Agreement.
 - (1) A parent or guardian who chooses to provide a home instruction program for his or her child shall initially sign a statement on a form prescribed by the State Department of Education which:
 - (a) Indicates consent to the requirements set forth in §§C, D, and E of this regulation; and
 - (b) Shall be submitted to the local superintendent at least 15 days before the beginning of a home instruction program.
 - (2) Annual Verification. Annually thereafter, before the beginning of the school year, a parent or guardian shall verify the continuation of home schooling for his or her child with the local school superintendent or with the supervising nonpublic school or institution described in Regulation .05 of this chapter.
 - (3) Change in Status. A parent or guardian shall notify the local school superintendent or the supervising nonpublic school or institution described in Regulation .05 of this chapter if a change occurs in the home school status of a child during the school year.
- C. Instruction Program.
 - (1) The home instruction program shall:
 - (a) Provide regular, thorough instruction in the studies usually taught in the public schools to children of the same age;
 - (b) Include instruction in English, mathematics, science, social studies, art, music, health, and physical education; and

- (c) Take place on a regular basis during the school year and be of sufficient duration to implement the instruction program.
- (2) The home instruction program may include enrollment on a part-time or full-time basis in courses offered by accredited or unaccredited colleges. Conal Ministry
- D. Educational Materials.
 - (1) A parent or guardian who chooses to provide a home instruction program for his or her child shall maintain a portfolio of materials which:
 - (a) Demonstrates the parent or guardian is providing regular, thorough instruction during the school year in the areas specified in §C(1) of this regulation;
 - (b) Includes relevant materials, such as instructional materials, reading materials, and examples of the child's writings, worksheets, workbooks, creative materials, and tests; and
 - (c) Shall be reviewed by the local superintendent or the superintendent's designee at the conclusion of each semester of the local school system at such times as are mutually agreeable to the local superintendent or designee and the parent or guardian.
 - (2) A parent or guardian who chooses to enroll his or her child under §C(2) of this regulation may elect to provide to the local superintendent or the superintendent's designee a copy of a report card or transcript from the accredited or unaccredited college at the conclusion of each semester of the accredited or unaccredited college in lieu of a portfolio of materials for the courses in which the child is enrolled under §C(2) of this regulation.
- E. A parent or guardian shall agree to permit a representative of a local school system to review the portfolio of educational materials and discuss the instructional program, provided that all of the following requirements are met:
 - (1) The review is at a time and place mutually agreeable to the representative of the local school system and the parent or guardian;
 - (2) The purpose of the review is to ensure that the child is receiving regular, thorough instruction as set forth in §C of this regulation; and
 - (3) There are not more than three reviews during a school year.
- F. Additional Requirements. A local school system may not impose additional requirements for home instruction programs other than those in these regulations.

13A.10.01.02

.02 Voluntary Participation in Standardized Testing.

Upon request of a parent or guardian, a child receiving home instruction may participate in the regularly scheduled standardized testing programs that are administered in the public school the child is eligible to attend.



13A.10.01.03

.03 Noncompliance with Requirements.

A. Failure to Consent. If a parent or guardian does not agree to the requirements of Regulation .01B, C, D, and E of this chapter, a child shall be enrolled promptly in a public school or nonpublic school as defined in COMAR 13A.09.09.02B.

- B. Deficiencies in the Program. If a local superintendent determines on the review of the home instruction program or inspection of the portfolio that a child is not receiving a regular, thorough instruction program in conformity with Regulation .01C and D, the local superintendent shall notify the parent or guardian in writing of any deficiencies in the program. The following apply:
 - (1) Within 30 days of receipt of written notification of any deficiencies, the parent or guardian shall provide evidence to the local superintendent that the deficiency has been or is being corrected.
 - (2) If a local superintendent determines there is not a satisfactory plan to correct a deficiency or if a deficiency is not corrected, a child shall be enrolled promptly in a public school or a nonpublic school as defined in COMAR 13A.09.09.02B.

13A.10.01.04

.04 Placement in Public School.

Upon application of a child for admission to a public school from a home instruction program, the local superintendent shall determine by an evaluation the placement of the child and any credits to be awarded toward high school graduation. The evaluation may include administration of standardized tests and examinations and interviews with the child.

13A.10.01.05

.05 Home Instruction Under Supervision of Nonpublic School or Institution.

- A. A parent or guardian may provide a home instruction program for his or her child without compliance with the requirements of this regulation, other than the requirements of Regulations .01B(1)(b) and .04 of this chapter, if that program offers regular, thorough instruction during the school year in the studies usually taught in the public schools to children of the same age and is under the supervision of a:
 - (1) School or institution offering an educational program operated by a bona fide church organization, and the supervision includes at a minimum all of the following components:



sadiist Church, (b) Textbooks, lesson materials, and other instructional materials or equipment designed to be used independently by the pupil at a site other than a school; and

- (c) Conferences with parents or guardians at appropriate intervals during the period of enrollment; or
- (2) Nonpublic school with a certificate of approval from the State Board of Education, and the supervision includes at a minimum all of the following components:
 - (a) Textbooks, lesson materials, and other instructional materials or equipment designed to be used independently by the pupil at a site other than a school; and
 - (b) Assignment of a school-based teacher to assist the home teacher in implementing the home instruction program and to assist the pupil by issuing progress reports, marking papers, and grading tests.
- B. The home instruction program may include enrollment on a part-time or full-time basis in courses offered by accredited or unaccredited colleges.
- C. Annual Verification. The supervising nonpublic school or institution described in §A of this regulation annually shall:
 - (1) Verify with the local school superintendent the identification of home schooled students whose instruction is continuing under its supervision;
 - (2) Notify the local school superintendent of the identification of home schooled students whose instruction is newly added to its supervision; and
 - (3) Provide the local school superintendent with the identification of home schooled students whose instruction is no longer under its supervision.
- D. Change in Status. The supervising nonpublic school or institution described in §A of this regulation shall notify the local school superintendent if a change occurs in the status of a home schooled student whose instruction was under its supervision during the school vear.

I. The Scriptures

The Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired and is God's revelation of Himself to man. It is a perfect treasure of divine instruction. It has God for its author, salvation for its end, and truth, without any mixture of error, for its matter. Therefore, all Scripture is totally true and trustworthy. It reveals the principles by which God judges us, and therefore is, and will remain to the end of the world, the true center of Christian union, and the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds, and religious opinions should be tried. All Scripture is a testimony to Christ, who is Himself the focus of divine revelation.

II. God

To Him we owe the highest love, reverence, and obedience. The eternal triune God reveals Himself to us as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, with distinct personal attributes, but without division of nature, essence, or being.

A. God the Father

God as Father reigns with providential care over His universe, His creatures, and the flow of the stream of human history according to the purposes of His grace. He is all powerful, all knowing, all loving, and all wise. God is Father in truth to those who become children of God through faith in Jesus Christ. He is fatherly in His attitude toward all men.

B. God the Son

He will return in power and glory to judge the world and to consummate His redemptive mission. He now dwells in all believers as the living and ever present Lord.

III. Man

Man is the special creation of God, made in His own image. He created them male and female as the crowning work of His creation. Onal Normal The gift of gender is thus part of the goodness of God's creation. In the beginning man was innocent of sin and was endowed by his Creator with freedom of choice. By his free choice man sinned against God and brought sin into the human race. Through the temptation of Satan man transgressed the command of God, and fell from his original innocence whereby his posterity inherit a nature and an environment inclined toward sin. Therefore, as soon as they are capable of moral action, they become transgressors and are under condemnation. Only the grace of God can bring man into His holy fellowship and enable man to fulfill the creative purpose of God. The sacredness of human personality is evident in that God created man in His own image, and in that Christ died for man; therefore, every person of every race possesses full dignity and is worthy of respect and Christian love.

IV. Salvation

Salvation involves the redemption of the whole man, and is offered freely to all who accept Jesus Christ as Lord and Saviour, who by His own blood obtained eternal redemption for the believer. In its broadest sense salvation includes regeneration, justification, sanctification, and glorification. There is no salvation apart from personal faith in Jesus Christ as Lord.

A. Regeneration, or the new birth, is a work of God's grace whereby believers become new creatures in Christ Jesus. It is a change of heart wrought by the Holy Spirit through conviction of sin, to which the sinner responds in repentance toward God and faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. Repentance and faith are inseparable experiences of grace.

Repentance is a genuine turning from sin toward God. Faith is the acceptance of Jesus Christ and commitment of the entire personality to Him as Lord and Saviour.

- B. Justification is God's gracious and full acquittal upon principles of His righteousness of all sinners who repent and believe in Christ. Justification brings the believer unto a relationship of peace and favor with God.
- C. Sanctification is the experience, beginning in regeneration, by which the believer is set apart to God's purposes, and is enabled to progress toward moral and spiritual maturity through the presence and power of the Holy Spirit dwelling in him. Growth in grace should continue throughout the regenerate person's life.
- D. Glorification is the culmination of salvation and is the final blessed and abiding state of the redeemed.

V. God's Purpose of Grace

Election is the gracious purpose of God, according to which He regenerates, justifies, sanctifies, and glorifies sinners. It is consistent with the free agency of man, and comprehends all the means in connection with the end. It is the glorious display of God's sovereign goodness, and is infinitely wise, holy, and unchangeable. It excludes boasting and promotes humility.

All true believers endure to the end. Those whom God has accepted in Christ, and sanctified by His Spirit, will never fall away from the state of grace, but shall persevere to the end. Believers may fall into sin through neglect and temptation, whereby they grieve the Spirit, impair their graces and comforts, and bring reproach on the cause of Christ and temporal judgments on themselves; yet they shall be kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

VI. The Church

A New Testament church of the Lord Jesus Christ is an autonomous local congregation of baptized believers, associated by covenant in the faith and fellowship of the gospel; observing the two ordinances of Christ, governed by His laws, exercising the gifts, rights, and privileges invested in them by His Word, and seeking to extend the gospel to the ends of the earth. Each congregation operates under the Lordship of Christ through democratic processes. In such a congregation each member is responsible and accountable to Christ as Lord. Its scriptural officers are pastors and deacons. While both men and women are gifted for service in the church, the office of pastor is limited to men as qualified by Scripture.

The New Testament speaks also of the church as the Body of Christ which includes all of the redeemed of all the ages, believers from every tribe, and tongue, and people, and nation.

VII. Baptism and the Lord's Supper

Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. It is an act of obedience symbolizing the believer's faith in a crucified, buried, and risen Saviour, the believer's death to sin, the burial of the old life, and the resurrection to walk in newness of life in Christ Jesus. It is a testimony to his faith in the final resurrection of the dead. Being a church ordinance, it is prerequisite to the privileges of church membership and to the Lord's Supper.

THE FILE COLLONAL MINISTRA

The Lord's Supper is a symbolic act of obedience whereby members of the church, through partaking of the bread and the fruit of the vine, memorialize the death of the Redeemer and anticipate His second coming.

Christians ought to pray and to labor that the Kingdom may come and God's will be done on earth. The full consummation of the Kingdom awaits the return of Jesus Christ and the end of this age.

Moreover, the cause of education in the Kingdom of Christ is co-ordinate with the causes of missions and general benevolence, and should receive along with these the liberal support of the churches. An adequate system of Christian education is necessary to a complete spiritual program for Christ's people.

In Christian education there should be a proper balance between academic freedom and academic responsibility. Freedom in any orderly relationship of human life is always limited and never absolute. The freedom of a teacher in a Christian school, college, or seminary is limited by the pre-eminence of Jesus Christ, by the authoritative nature of the Scriptures, and by the distinct purpose for which the school exists.

XIII. Stewardship

God is the source of all blessings, temporal and spiritual; all that we have and are we owe to Him. Christians have a spiritual debtorship to the whole world, a holy trusteeship in the gospel, and a binding stewardship in their possessions. They are therefore under obligation to serve Him with their time, talents, and material possessions; and should recognize all these as entrusted to them to use for the glory of God and for helping others. According to the Scriptures, Christians should contribute of their means cheerfully, regularly, systematically, proportionately, and liberally for the advancement of the Redeemer's cause on earth.

XIV. Cooperation

Christ's people should, as occasion requires, organize such associations and conventions as may best secure cooperation for the great objects of the Kingdom of God. Such organizations have no authority over one another or over the churches. They are voluntary and advisery bodies designed to elicit, combine, and direct the energies of our people in the most effective manner. Members of New Testament churches should cooperate with one another in carrying forward the missionary, educational, and benevolent ministries for the extension of Christ's Kingdom. Christian unity in the New Testament sense is spiritual harmony and voluntary cooperation for common ends by various groups of Christ's people. Cooperation is desirable between the various Christian denominations, when the end to be attained is itself justified, and when such cooperation involves no violation of conscience or compromise of loyalty to Christ and His Word as revealed in the New Testament.

XV. The Christian and the Social Order

All Christians are under obligation to seek to make the will of Christ supreme in our own lives and in human society. Means and methods used for the improvement of society and the establishment of righteousness among men can be truly and permanently helpful only when they are rooted in the regeneration of the individual by the saving grace of God in Jesus Christ. In the spirit of Christ, Christians should oppose racism, every form of greed, selfishness, and vice, and all forms of sexual immorality, including adultery, homosexuality, and pornography. We should work to provide for the orphaned, the needy, the abused, the aged, the helpless, and the sick. We should speak on behalf of the unborn and contend for the sanctity of all human life from conception to natural death. Every Christian should seek to bring industry, government, and society as a whole under the sway of the principles of righteousness, truth, and brotherly love. In order to promote these ends Christians should be ready to work with all men of good will in any good cause, always being careful to act in the spirit of love without compromising their loyalty to Christ and His truth.

XVI. Peace and War

It is the duty of Christians to seek peace with all men on principles of righteousness. In accordance with the spirit and teachings of Christ they should do all in their power to put an end to war.

The true remedy for the war spirit is the gospel of our Lord. The supreme need of the world is the acceptance of His teachings in all the affairs of men and nations, and the practical application of His law of love. Christian people throughout the world should pray for the reign of the Prince of Peace.

XVII. Religious Liberty

God alone is Lord of the conscience, and He has left it free from the doctrines and commandments of men which are contrary to His Word or not contained in it. Church and state should be separate. The state owes to every church protection and full freedom in the pursuit of its spiritual ends. In providing for such freedom no ecclesiastical group or denomination should be favored by the state more than others. Civil government being ordained of God, it is the duty of Christians to render loyal obedience thereto in all things not contrary to the revealed will of God. The church should not resort to the civil power to carry on its work. The gospel of Christ contemplates spiritual means alone for the pursuit of its ends. The state has no right to impose penalties for religious opinions of any kind. The state has no right to impose taxes for the support of any form of religion. A free church in a free state is the Christian ideal, and this implies the right of free and unhindered access to God on the part of all men, and the right to form and propagate opinions in the sphere of religion without interference by the civil power.

XVIII. The Family

God has ordained the family as the foundational institution of human society. It is composed of persons related to one another by marriage, blood, or adoption.

Marriage is the uniting of one man and one woman in covenant commitment for a lifetime. It is God's unique gift to reveal the union between Christ and His church and to provide for the man and the woman in marriage the framework for intimate companionship, the channel of sexual expression according to biblical standards, and the means for procreation of the human race.

The husband and wife are of equal worth before God, since both are created in God's image. The marriage relationship models the way God relates to His people. A husband is to love his wife as Christ loved the church. He has the God-given responsibility to provide for, to protect, and to lead his family. A wife is to submit herself graciously to the servant leadership of her husband even as the church willingly submits to the headship of Christ. She, being in the image of God as is her husband and thus equal to him, has the God-given responsibility to respect her husband and to serve as his helper in managing the household and nurturing the next generation.

Children, from the moment of conception, are a blessing and heritage from the Lord. Parents are to demonstrate to their children God's pattern for marriage. Parents are to teach their children spiritual and moral values and to lead them, through consistent lifestyle example and loving discipline, to make choices based on biblical truth. Children are to honor and obey their parents.
